Late Spring 2020 - 2023 Fire in the Meadow

For the third year, the Moraga Orinda Fire District conducted a prescribed burn of the meadow. This fuel-reduction method benefits the ecology of the meadow by killing the invading saplings and promoting the diversity of native meadow herbs.

The Ohlone People set fire to the grasslands periodically to promote wild rye grass, soap root and clover that attract wildlife. Fire also opened up the woodlands, making it easier to travel

High School Students as Citizen Wildlife Scientists April 2021 to June 2022

Under the guidance of UC Berkeley Emeritus Professor of Wildlife Biology, Reg Barrett, 12 students monitored RECONIX camera traps situated in five habitats of the Nature Area: wetland, grassland, shrubland, woodland, and riparian. Students participated year-round on the second Saturday of the month and recorded 22 species of mammals and birds.

Starting at the wetland, they refilled the three bait stations at each camera. Most months, they found the bait pans empty, and re-filled them again with dog chow, fresh blueberries, and hog chow. Students took turns changing the camera chips so that animals visiting the bait had their pictures taken during the following month. Dr. Barrett posted the photos of the species on Google Drive for everyone to study. Students wrote research reports about their findings. Partial funding was from the North American Association of Environmental Educators, (YLACES) Program and Friends of the Nature Area (FONA).
